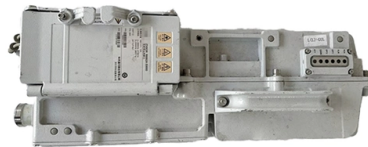

These cables can be installed directly in cable trays without conduit, provided they are supported, secured, and protected from excessive mechanical damage according to code. This open installation allows for easy access for maintenance, inspection, and future cable additions.

When Conduit is Required

Conduit may be necessary for tray cables in situations where additional protection is needed:

- High-risk areas: Locations with forklifts, vehicles, or heavy equipment that could crush or damage cables.
