The other end of a fiber optic tray typically connects to either a patch panel, optical distribution frame, or another splice tray, depending on whether the fiber is being terminated or spliced.

Fiber Routing and Termination

A fiber optic splice tray organizes and protects fiber splices, whether for fusion splicing or mechanical splicing. The fibers entering the tray are stripped, spliced, and coiled within the tray for protection and proper bend radius management. The other end of the tray is where the fibers exit and continue to their next connection point. This could be:

- Patch panels or optical distribution frames (ODFs): These serve as central hubs for fiber management, allowing fibers to be connected to network equipment or other fibers.
- Drop cables or pigtailed: If the tray is at a termination point, fibers may be fused to pre-terminated pigtailed that plug directly into switches, transceivers, or other active devices.
- Intermediate splice trays: In long runs, fibers may continue to another splice tray along the route, maintaining protection and organization.

Connection Methods

The fibers exiting the tray can be terminated in two main ways :
